

GENEALOGY: WHAT IS IT?

- Greek meaning "The knowledge of generations"
- The study of family history using Primary Sources such as Census Records, City Directories, Birth & Death Certificates
 - Something certified, witnessed, documented



Genealogy

- Bare bones just the facts
- Names, dates, places

...but eventually leads us to understand lifestyles, historical context, biographies, motivations and migrations of our people



CENSUS FACT & GAPS

- USA census data is released 72 years after the census
- USA census collection: 1790-1940
 - 1890 census lost in a fire
- Canada census collection: 1851-1911
- UK census collection: 1841-1911
- People can "disappear" for years or decades for various reasons
- Many countries' census data has yet to be computerized

FAMILY HISTORY

- The study of your family through:
 - Oral histories
 - Historical books
 - Family lore
 - Personal knowledge
- Family history makes Genealogy come to life
 - The facts plus...stories, recipes, songs, customs, hardships & struggles, hopes of generations past
 - This is where you paint the picture of your life & your family

WHY BECOME THE FAMILY HISTORIAN?


- A Portable & relatively inexpensive hobby
- Consider it a gift for future generations
- You may feel responsible to tell what you know or learn
- Continual learning
- Find out where your family fits in history

- Binds you to family
- Connects you to ancestors
- Preserves family lore & traditions
- Intellectually stimulating, enriches your life
- Often fascinating!

- Paints a picture of life

- From the Home Page pull down the Family Tree menu
- Choose Start a New Tree
- Start with yourself and enter all you know
- Input your parents particulars
- Wait for the tree to form
- Click on the Hints and off you go!

ANCESTRY LEAVES


 Hover over someone in your tree and a card will appear

ANCESTRY PROFILE CARD


- See Birth and Death Dates and Places




ALL THAT ANCESTRY.COM HAS TO OFFER

SEARCH ON ANCESTRY

- Start with Census records but make sure to use the Card Catalogue!
- Look for names, dates, places
- Birth, baptism, military, addresses, marriage, immigration, children, careers, death
- Consider looking for grave sites

- An **app** that is fully integrated with Ancestry.com
- Easy to use
- Download FamilyTreeMaker.com for about \$70
- Once you have the data harvested from Ancestry.com, you use FamilyTreeMaker to organize, share, document and run reports
- Work offline or online
- Watch and/or read the tutorial

- Free!
- Owned and operated by the Church of the Latter Day Saints
- Research your relatives on line

WHAT ELSE CAN YOU DO?

- Scan your family photos and add your genealogy research to make a book to give to your family
- Write your stories for future generations
- Research more generations or study the history of a small village your family might have lived in or the ship they arrived in or their Ellis Island experience. There is always more to learn
- Make sure to document your Descendants next!

TIPS AND TRICKS

- Always use a woman's Maiden Name
- If you get stumped go to Ancestry.com Learning Center
- Go to YouTube.com and ask your question
- Always scroll all the way down on your websites
- When looking at a Census report, browse the records several pages in each direction looking for relatives
- Research using all the creativity and curiosity you can muster
